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2023 Reddington Scholarship

To Diocese of Rochester Catholic Schools:

The Reverend John A. Reddington Scholarship Fund was established under the Will of Father Reverend John Reddington to provide for Catholic education at any level and for college education (nondenominational) for residents of the Diocese of Rochester. A scholarship committee exists to review all applications and to select individuals to receive scholarship grants.

There is no limit on the number of times a student may apply for a scholarship. Scholarships are not automatically renewed each year. Students must reapply annually.

The Scholarship Fund is a needs-based fund, but the student must be performing to his/her potential. This past spring we had (94) students apply for the scholarship and were able to assist (94) applicants. Scholarships awarded are in the average range of \$100.00 to \$500.00 per year. The committee will only consider those applications that indicate a family's maximum yearly income of \$60K or LESS and require proof of school registration of student attending.
